Opportunities For Members To Use the Camp

There are several opportunities for you as Elks members to utilize and enjoy our state project—the Minnesota Elks Youth Camp.

Elks Kids Week

The children and grandchildren of Elks members are able to attend one of the weeks set aside during the summer designated as Elks Kids Week. The Elks member sponsoring a child must be from one of the 24 lodges throughout Minnesota and in good standing. It only costs \$175/Elks child and children can also bring a friend or two for a fee of \$225 each. It's an inexpensive way to introduce your children and their friends to

a great north woods experience.

Family Camp

The camp sets aside one weekend—Friday through Sunday—in mid August for Elks members and their family to enjoy the camp. You can stay in one of the many buildings with kitchens, one of the camper bunkhouses or bring up an RV or trailer and park on our softball field. Space is on a first come first serve basis so register early.

Minnesota Elks Youth Camp

N A HEAVILY WOODED AREA in central Minnesota, on the southern shore of Pelican Lake, sits a cluster of cabins, athletic fields, and other facilities that make up the Minnesota Elks Youth Camp. Every year for seven weeks, the camp is filled with the happy sounds of campers enjoying sports, cookouts, and other outdoor activities. This is the state major project of the Minnesota Elks Association, which has held summer camps for a total of about thirty-five thousand children since the first camp session was held in 1954.

The camp's 290 acres of property were acquired in 1950 and are located about 140 miles north of Minneapolis. The property boasts a beach, boat house, and pier on Pelican Lake, and the camp's grounds also extend to the banks of three other lakes. Other features of the camp include a miniature golf course, a baseball diamond, a basketball court, a golf driving range, an outdoor stage, an archery range, a climbing wall, and a well-stocked art center.

Minnesota Elks Association lodges sponsor about one hundred boys and girls ages nine to thirteen to attend the camp every week for four weeks in June and July. These sponsorships are awarded at each lodge's discretion and are intended for children who would not otherwise have a camp experience. Lodges also provide transportation for the children to and from the camp. In some cases, when children need additional help to enjoy the experience, their sponsoring lodges go the extra mile for them. In one case, when it was discovered that a boy had arrived at camp without any gym shoes, members of his sponsoring lodge provided him with a pair. At the end of the week, the camper tried to return the shoes and was told that they were his to keep.

The four weeks of lodge-sponsored camp are followed by a session known as Troops Week, which provides a camp experience for children of deployed US armed

forces service members and other family members of active-duty and retired armed forces personnel. In most years, about thirty children of service members attend this session, but in 2018 that number grew to sixty-three because of outreach by Elks during a recent deployment of Minnesota National Guard members. In addition to regular camp activities, Troops Week includes a military appreciation day, which features a presentation by a volunteer color guard from the VFW, American Legion, or another service organization and a patriotic speech by a guest speaker. During the camp's Military Appreciation Day, a representative from Minnesota National Guard Camp Ripley brings a military

vehicle to the camp that the children can explore and a set of combat uniforms that the children can try on to experience the weight of the protective gear. According to Elks National Veterans Service Commission Minnesota State Chairman Thomas Kramin, the camp "gives kids of deployed troops a week to get their minds off of missing their parents."

The camp also hosts two weeks of camp for the children and grandchildren of Elks in late July through early August, a weekend retreat for Elks families in the middle of August, and the state Soccer Shoot championship. The summer camp sessions are overseen by a professional camp supervisor and are run by a staff of thirty-nine counselors, most of whom are college students. In recognition of the counselors' service, the Minnesota Elks Association awards them with scholarships each year to supplement the wages they earn. In 2018, the total value of the scholarships was \$11,000.

Elks from around Minnesota hold fund-raising events year-round to support their camp and their sponsored campers. One notable fund-raiser is a Fourth of July fun run that begins and ends at the camp's beach on

> the shore of Pelican Lake. The run winds its way around Lake Markee, which is one of the smaller lakes on the camp's property, and then returns to the Pelican Lake beach. There is also a statewide raffle held at the camp that raises \$50,000 for the state major project each year. In addition, about two hundred local lodge members gather at the camp each May for a weeklong working vacation, during which Elks repair and improve buildings, clear leaves and underbrush, and perform other necessary maintenance to get the camp ready for the summer season. About fifty Elks from around the state return in September for a long weekend to prepare the camp for winter.

> Thanks to the Minnesota Elks Association members' hard work and generous support, hundreds of children every year get to enjoy time spent outdoors, engaged in positive activities. Nearly sixty-five years after the youth camp's founding, Minnesota Elks are still showing that they are among the Best People On Earth.
