From the Camp Board

Greetings from the Youth Camp Board of Directors:

Due to Covid, we held 4 sessions this summer at the camp. The last two weeks in July and the first two weeks of August we had 200 members kids, grandkids, and guests. Everything went fine, there were no issues, the weather was fantastic, and all attending had a great time.

During camp opening, we installed a new walk-in freezer (pictured at right) and a new dishwasher. These were two needed improvements. Camp closing was held on September 23rd, 24th and 25th. Two pet peeves of mine got cleaned up. First being the pole building and second the bicycle building. A lot of other work was accomplished also with the 30 members in attendance. Thank you to all the members that came to camp and pitched in to help.



The Youth Camp Board of Directors, along with the Executive Director met on Saturday September 25th at 9:00 a.m. A very productive meeting was held.

- First, we approved Rules of the Camp for hosting the Fall Conventions. The rules will be given to the convention chairman and discussed. No exceptions to the rules will be allowed.
- Second, new bicycles. We are going to start a program and will be purchasing 30 bicycles to start with at \$150.00 each. Lodges or members wishing to donate money can do so, but we ask that you do not buy any bikes on your own. We are going to be purchasing all the same kind of bike in different sizes.
- Third, Family Camp. There will be no Family Camp for 2022. The Camp Board will review in the Fall of 2022 to discuss Family Camp for 2023.
- Fourth, the Winona House. We are going to remodel the inside of the Winona House. Hopkins and Winona have both committed to donating money with the Camp matching the funds. Plans are to start in the Spring of 2022.

Earlier this summer the camp board of directors approved the purchase of a new pontoon boat and sold an old one to help defer costs. We reviewed the Youth Camp budget from April 1st to August 31st and all numbers are in line with the budget. The meeting was adjourned at 10:30 a.m. Your Youth Camp Directors are listed along the left side of this page. All were in attendance for Youth Camp closing and the meeting. I want to thank them all for their commitment.

Hope you all plan on getting out to the camp this weekend.

I have more responsibilities like taking care of 10 kids in the Mohawk cabin, reminding them to take their towels to free swim, keeping them safe as they hang out with each other, and giving them the wonderful experience at camp that I had when I was a camper. I've learned how to interact better with kids when it comes to dealing with homesickness, arguments, and boredom, which will be great skills to have when I have kids of my own.

I have seen campers in my cabin shed tears for the first three nights because they were homesick, but then shed tears as they're leaving because they had so much fun here that they don't wanna leave. It's at this point that I realized that Elks Camp hasn't just changed my life: Elks Camp gave me the opportunity to change the lives of others. I have enjoyed every day on camp working with these kids, and I cannot wait to have another opportunity to show more kids that there's so much more to life than a screen.
